Sure we have had major problems in the world during my lifetime but they never were here in my own country until the 9/11/2001 attack. But even that did not cause long term issues within our society.

Along comes a virus in 2020 that has the world in turmoil, governments scrambling, medical personnel exhausted treating the sheer numbers of those infected, hospitals filled to capacity, medical supplies running low and thousands dying in many countries including the United States. All of this from a novel virus that we were not prepared for in any way.

Being a person of faith, I have always believed that my Faith brings Hope and my Hope brings Joy. So without Faith there is neither Hope nor Joy. I have been praying that all of us will stay healthy and safe during these tumultuous times. Also, I believe when we are past the Pandemic that our Faith will be strengthened.

A Rogers and Hammerstein song has been running through my head for a few days now and I think it is appropriate to share the lyrics with you.

WE ARE NOT IN THE SAME BOAT

I heard that we are in the same boat. But it's not like that. We are in the same storm, but not in the same boat. Your ship can be shipwrecked and mine might not be. Or vice versa.

For some, quarantine is optimal: moment of reflection, of re-connection. Easy, in flip flops, with a whiskey or tea. For others, this is a desperate crisis. For others it is facing loneliness. For some, a peace, rest time, vacation. Yet for others, Torture: How am I going to pay my bills? Some were concerned about a brand of chocolate for Easter (this year there were no rich chocolates). Others were concerned about the bread for the weekend, or if the noodles would last for a few more days. Some were in their "home office". Others are looking through trash to survive. Some want to go back to work because they are running out of money. Others want to kill those who break the quarantine. Some need to break the quarantine to stand in line at the banks. Others to escape. Others criticize the government for the lines. Some have experienced the near death of the virus, some have already lost someone from it, some are not sure their loved ones are going to make it, and some don't even believe they are infallible and will be blown away if or when this hits someone they know. Some have faith in God and expect miracles during this 2020. Others say the worse is yet to come.

So, friends, we are not in the same boat. We are going through a time when our perceptions and needs are completely different. And each one will emerge, in his own way, from that storm. Some with a tan from their pool. Others with scars on the soul (for invisible reasons). It is very important to see beyond what is seen at first glance. Not just looking, more than looking, seeing. See beyond the political party, beyond religion, beyond the nose on your face.

Do not underestimate the pain of others if you do not feel it. Do not judge the good life of the other, do not condemn the bad life of the other. Don't be a judge. Let us not judge the one who lacks, as well as the one who exceeds him.

Instructions for viewing St. Paul's service through Zoom.

- Stephen Jones will serve as our facilitator throughout the service. He suggests that you sign onto the Zoom meeting at about 8:45 a.m. to ensure that you are in the meeting and ready to go at 9:00.
- Fr. Bill will conduct the service from his home with the capable assistance of his lovely wife Pat (thanks to both of you for leading this effort!).
- After the service is completed there will be an opportunity for community sharing using the app. I look forward to seeing or hearing from many of you on Sunday!
- You can participate on your telephone (you won't be able to view the video image, but you will hear everything), your smart phone, your tablet or your computer (instructions to follow).

This will be the first of what we hope will be weekly services until such time it is safe to gather once again as a community in Christ. While it is likely that some will experience some technical "glitches" along the way, I would ask each of you to "keep the faith" as we work through the issues and fine-tune the process. I am hopeful that this will be a new and exciting way to gather and worship communally until such time as we can once again gather in worship at St. Paul's.

Here is some guidance from Stephen to help you access the service:

1. On a **regular phone** (you won't get any video, just the audio)

If you're connecting to listen to the audio on a phone, call (301-715-8592), and when asked for a meeting number, key in 96472984781 then press the pound key (#), and when asked for your attendee number, just hit the pound key (#) again.

2. Computer/smartphone/tablet (both video and audio will be available)

To Install the Zoom software:

Download and install the application.

Once you have downloaded, you can install the application (automatically done if you are on a phone or a tablet) In the case of a computer, just click on the file downloaded and choose all the default questions to get started and a new Zoom icon will be right there.

OK – now that Zoom is on your device...

Instructions for Computer Users:

Make sure your computer's video camera is working and microphone is turned on and muted.

Anywhere from 15 to 5 minutes before a zoom meeting or worship is scheduled to start, **click on the meeting URL – https://zoom.us/j/96472984781.**

Zoom will then automatically load itself, give you the opportunity to test your video camera and mike, then place you in a waiting room until just before the video gathering begins.

Instructions for Smartphone/Tablet Users:

Make sure you downloaded and installed the Zoom app (available from the Apple App Store or GooglePlay).

About 5 minutes before the service is scheduled, open the Zoom app and **enter the meeting number**

The Zoom app will then place you in a waiting room until just before the video gathering begins.

And Here's How to Actually Join

There are many easy ways to join.

If you're on a computer/tablet/phone, just double click the following web address: https://zoom.us/j/96472984781. Once you join a meeting, the application will ask two questions:

Do you want to use the device's audio (internet) or call into the meeting. If you have good internet, use this option, otherwise if you call in the sound may be more clear.

Do you want to use video? By default, it wants you to use the camera, and we welcome it! We find it to be more community-building to see and hear all of you!

As I said, this may seem daunting at first but after a couple services you will be an "old pro". Thankfully, the program is very intuitive and will walk you through the process. Stay well, take care of yourselves and I look forward to seeing (or hearing from) all of you on Sunday morning as we move into this new form of worship! Jeff Spaulding
