### Caring for the Flock - Pastoral Care

In John 21: 15-17, Jesus asked Peter, "Simon, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes,

Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus directed him to "Feed my lambs." Jesus repeats the question, and Peter responds with another "yes!" "Tend my sheep." Jesus tells him. He asks a third time, Peter again says "yes." Jesus tells him: "Feed my sheep."

Pastoral Care is the phrase we use to describe all the ways we reach out in love for one another within the congregation and out into the surrounding community. It is how we feed ad tend the flock that follows Jesus. We are especially called to feed and tend members of the flock who are in grief, grave illness, imprisoned, hospitalized, in recovery or active addiction, facing mental health crises, and other very serious conditions. Additionally, pastoral care includes supporting Mark Your Calendars Sundays, in October. Services at St. Paul's are at <u>11:15 a.m.</u> each week.

individuals families through a variety of transitions, including marriage, divorce, birth, adoption, baptism, confirmation, adolescence, career transitions, discernment, retirement, and more.

Often the care of the flock is administered as we worship or chat over a cup of coffee together afterwards. As we work together in the thrift store or on a committee, we may share prayer requests and offer one another support. The congregation provides much support to one another as it lives out its ministries together. Sometimes it is useful to speak with a priest, especially if one desires to make a confession as part of their care.

If you are in need of care for illness, grief, personal crisis, transition, etc., we are here to support you and offer compassionate Christian companionship along the way. One of the most useful practices when facing a challenge is to keep showing up for worship. Allow the rhythms of the service and the presence of the faithful people carry you for a time. You may also wish to speak with me, or with Jennifer Grimelli, Associate for Ministry, or with Amy Shimonkevitz, the deacon.

For pastoral care we offer:

- guidance and counsel
- referrals and resources in terms of healthcare, mental healthcare, addiction/recovery
- visitation if hospitalized or homebound
- holy communion if you are unable to come to church
- the laying on of hands for healing and healing prayer
- Inclusion in the weekly prayers of the people
- The Rite of Reconciliation (private and confidential confession) is offered by the priest-in-charge to those who feel particularly burdened by things done and left undone and feel a need for counsel and absolution. Contact Lynda Sheckels to schedule confession(410)-489-4411

### A Message from Bishop Eugene Taylor Sutton

Dear People of the Diocese of Maryland,

After a season of prayer, discernment and consultation with my family, trusted friends, and advisors, I write to you to call for the election of a bishop coadjutor to take place in Spring 2023. My intention is to serve with my successor until sometime in 2024 when, God willing, I will resign and retire after 16 wonderful years as your diocesan bishop.



I have notified the Most Reverend Michael B. Curry, presiding bishop of The Episcopal Church, and the Right Reverend Todd Ousley, who serves in the Presiding Bishop's Office as the Bishop for Pastoral Development, of my intentions, and they assure us of their love and support of our diocese as we enter this time of transition. I'm also extremely grateful for the advice and consent of the Standing Committee in leading up to this announcement, and in a few days they will be communicating with you about next steps in the transition process.

My decision in making this announcement comes from a happy place in my life both personally and professionally. In both the good times and hard times that come to all of us in church leadership, I've been constantly amazed and gratified by the amount of love and support that you, the people of this diocese, have given to your bishop and to each other. I have joyfully and faithfully served with you since 2008, but now it's time for me to begin the process of stepping aside to allow a fresh generation of leadership to guide us as a diocese into the future.

We've accomplished much together, and for the next few years we have much more to do. In living into our vision of being a community of love, we are continuing our mission efforts in congregational vitality, new church starts, Christian formation and racial reconciliation. I'm energized about upcoming efforts to support both the Claggett Center and the Sutton Scholars High School Enrichment program in exciting new ways. In these and in so many other ways, our common mission of encountering Christ everywhere and engaging in God's ministry of reconciliation in Maryland and beyond continues.

May God bless us, and may the Holy Spirit lead us as we journey together in the years ahead.
