

Letter from the Pastor

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Alleluia! Christ is Risen! The Lord is Risen, indeed! Alleluia! As we make our way through the Great Fifty Days of Easter, we find ourselves still at the mercy of a virus that is still on the loose, and changing itself to become more virulent and dangerous as time rolls on. It is like being a yo-yo (remember those!) or on a roller coaster with directives from Public Health Officials and the Diocese one day letting us back into church for worship, and the next day saying, "Not so fast!" It is sometimes easy to forget that as the virus evolves so must the science adapt to the new pathogen environment in terms of setting out safe policy measures to help keep the virus at bay.

Fortunately, one thing has remained steady: our capacity to Live Stream Worship and have our Vestry and other committees of the parish meet regularly online thanks to the "miracle" of Zoom! In fact, opportunities to worship together via Live Stream have made it possible to pray with one another six days a week instead of our former one-day a week schedule! Monday through Friday we study scripture, pray, and practice Centering Prayer with one another, resulting in regular opportunities to support one another day-by-day as the world-wide Pandemic wears on.

We find ourselves in a situation not unlike those who followed Jesus as chronicled in the four Gospels and the Book of the Acts of the Apostles. His Jewish followers in his homeland Israel had to adapt not only to the untimely and violent death of their friend and God's anointed Beloved Son, but also continued harassment and oppression inflicted on them by the occupying Roman Empire which soon resulted in the destruction of Jerusalem and the Jerusalem Temple – the center of Jewish religious life for centuries. Burned to the ground by Rome, it has never been rebuilt.

In Acts we read repeatedly that the infant Jesus Movement in Jerusalem worshipped and prayed at the Temple "daily," while also still participating in the great religious festivals like Passover and Pentecost (Pentecost was first and foremost a Jewish harvest festival and a time to remember receiving the commandments at Mount Sinai during the forty-year sojourn that resulted in the formation of the people called Israel).

With the Temple gone, both Christians and Jews had to completely reimagine what would form the center of their religious worship and day-to-day life as people of God. There would never again be an altar and a priesthood dedicated to making sacrifices to the God of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Jesus. As Christians re-enacted a memorial of the Last Supper and pooled their resources to take care of any and all who were in need, Judaism evolve into what is sometimes now referred to as "Rabbinic Judaism," focused on study of the scriptures, prayer, social justice and acts of loving kindness.

It is not clear what 'church' will look like if and when the Pandemic is under some sort of containment. What is clear is that the people of Christ Church Forest Hill, Rock Spring Parish, love one another, support one another and continue to worship together despite having to do so remotely. This will end up being an exciting reset for the Church as it finds ever new ways to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ – to share with others "what we have seen and heard" as Peter declared before the assembled community leaders at the Jerusalem Temple. Christ is Alive! And so are we as we find ourselves in the beginning of a new adventure for the Body of Christ, his Church.

We Are those People who Adapt to Changing Situations!

The Body of Christ, his Church, has always been in a state of fluid change since the earliest days in Jerusalem. As it spread through out the ancient world, meeting the needs of different peoples and cultures made it necessary to adapt and change. Nowhere was this more evident than in the British Isles where the missionaries sent from Rome were instructed to incorporate existing religious customs as the Church established itself among the great diversity of peoples who live on those islands. One eventual result was the Church of England (CoE), which in turn sent missionaries around the world establishing independent churches linked to Canterbury Cathedral known as the Anglican Communion.

Following events in Germany and Switzerland, the CoE found itself involved on the forefront of the Reformation. This resulted in translating scriptures and liturgies that had long been available only in Latin (from the Church in Rome) or Greek (from the Church in Constantinople). The Reformation dream of farmers working their fields with one hand on the plow and the Bible in their own language in the other hand eventually resulted in Archbishop Cranmer's Book of Common Prayer.

As familiar as it seems to us today, this was a significant adaptation of Monastic prayer practices married to the central act of Christian worship, Holy Communion, or The Eucharist. Cranmer's personal dream was of each Anglican household practicing morning, evening and bedtime prayers, and coming together with other families on Sunday to hear the Eucharistic Prayers in English for the first time!

As the Anglican Communion spread around the world, each church in the communion eventually developed its own version of Cranmer's Book of Common Prayer (BCP). In the American church, known as the Episcopal Church in the young colonies, we have had four revisions of the Episcopal Book of Common Prayer, resulting in the present book in 1979 – still often referred to as "the new prayerbook."! Each revision adapted to new and evolving life in the American Experiment called the United States of America, and to incorporate traditional prayers that had been lost in the Reformation efforts, being revived by new scholarship. For instance, what we call Prayer D in the 1979 BCP is the oldest prayer in the current prayerbook, dating from approximately the second or third century – and a Eucharistic prayer that is already agreed to be used should the church ever find its way back to being One Church, One Body in Christ.

The point is, the Church has never been a static institution, but rather a living, adapting and evolving manifestation of the Spirit of Jesus Christ – who himself, as we learn from reading the Gospels, was always adapting to new situations in his life among us. Adaptation has been the one constant in the life of His Body, the Church. We can be assured we will continue to adapt as we emerge from this current life in The Time of Covid-19. What the Church will be in the days ahead we cannot know, but it will always reflect the Spirit of life and love for all persons, all creatures and creation itself that is the very Spirit of the Risen Lord. Resurrection! Perhaps the most powerful change ever! And we are called to be a people of the Resurrection!


Our first fundraiser will be a **BACK IN BLOOM!** Raffle Basket. PLUS we have

Christ Church Vestry Minutes February 10, 2021 [Virtual meeting via Zoom]

Attendance: Fr. Kirk, Lyn Edmunds, Leslie Amtmann, Molly Neal, Lloyd Merriam, Laurie Morris, Marianne Kidd and Kate Davis.

The meeting began at 7:03 PM with contemplative prayer.

The vestry minutes from the last meeting were approved.

Treasurer's report – the full report will be available next time, as the most recent bank statement is still pending. The balance in our checking account is currently \$5,113.

The Rigdon family gave a very generous donation in memory of George and Mary Rigdon. We will consider ideas for a memorial in/around the church grounds.

Cemetery Committee report – Leslie responded with information to an inquiry someone had about a burial plot in the cemetery.

Rector's report – Fr. Kirk sent us a detailed outline of the plan for Ash Wednesday, which will soon be distributed to parishioners via email, as well as posted on our website, Facebook page and the Chimes newsletter. During Lent, Fr. Kirk will be doing a study of "The Book of Ruth" at the Noonday prayers. People are welcome to attend any/all of the sessions.

Sr. Warden's report – Molly and Dave M. met with Town Security representative on 1/28 for an overview. Our security system is for fire only and the cost is \$2,000/year, which includes an annual maintenance check-up in July. If smoke or fire alarm goes off, then they would dispatch emergency service and one of our points of contact (Molly, Dave M. or Kate) would need to meet them at the Annex to let them in. Otherwise, if it is a non-emergency alert (eg., low battery, power outage or weather-related issue), the system will reset itself.

Since the Roving Shelter donation effort was put on hold due to lack of need, we completed a successful food/drink drive for The Hope Alliance. Molly dropped off our donations at Victorious Faith on 2/8 and they coordinated the final drop-off.

Molly will be distributing an updated phone tree to the vestry that will be used for "Just Checking In" to see how people are doing during this time of church separation due to Covid.

There was a recent article about a Lutheran church in Monkton that was added to the Historical Register, which prompts the question of whether we should look into this for Christ Church. It was actually something we researched many years ago, but there was a reason we decided not to go that route (would need to revisit notes to find out more).

Leslie mentioned we've been getting mail for another local church (called Christ Fellowship Church) on Industry Lane, so she's been sending it back. Hopefully, they're doing the same if they get any of our mail. There is a widespread issue with mail delays lately, as well. She also noticed the cross on top of the church is leaning over a bit toward the bell tower. It would be worth a call to an expert to get a quote for repairs to prevent future damage. Molly will check with Phil Klein if he has any references.

The plan for snow removal is as follows: Rob Lane will continue to plow parking lot. Going forward, Tyler and Justin Davis will help with shoveling sidewalks and steps to the Annex. Dave M. had been handling that piece previously (we thank him for all his hard work!).

Lyn E. will send out an invitation to all parishioners for our next "Coffee Hour Zoom" that will be on Sunday, 2/14 at Noon.

The next meeting will be on 3/17 at 7:00pm.

At 8:23pm, the meeting ended with a closing prayer.

Christ Church Vestry Minutes March 17, 2021 [Virtual meeting via Zoom]

Attendance: Fr. Kirk, Lyn Edmunds, Lois Tidey, Leslie Amtmann, Molly Neal, Lloyd Merriam, Laurie Morris, Melinda Chase and Kate Davis.

The meeting began at 7:05 PM with contemplative prayer.

The vestry minutes from the last meeting were approved.

Treasurer's report – the balance in our checking account is currently \$10,572, of which \$5,453 is reserved. Leslie requested to no longer track the building/property reserve fund separately. This was approved. She received an update regarding the church's insurance that communicable disease is not included in our policy.

Leslie sent the vestry a draft parochial report for 2020, which was approved, pending final adjustments to some of the line items/questions. In reviewing 2020 records, she noticed that the amount of expenses was slightly off, so she has updated the year-end financial report. The Warm Hearts Cool Worship campaign has about \$8,000 left to reach full re-payment on the loan from the cemetery fund.

There was no activity to report for the Cemetery Committee.

Rector's report – Fr. Kirk will look into getting a grant for technology expenses to help with keeping up the live stream services, once we re-open (as we will continue to have the live stream option, going forward).

We discussed option for when we re-open in-person service and decided a good compromise would be to have in-person services with Communion (and the live stream option), on the 1st, 3rd and 5th Sundays of each month. And the 2nd and 4th Sundays would be morning prayer (live stream only). When there is communion, it will now be given out in small disposable paper cups that will be placed on a tray, which parishioners may take on the way out.

For now, we don't have an effective sign-up/reservation process that would reach all our members. If we end up getting more than 25 people at the in-person service, the vestry members in

attendance could move down to the Parish Hall and view the live stream service by connecting to WiFi.

Fr. Kirk will keep us posted of times when he will be away – in May (for clergy conference) and in August (family vacation).

Plans for Holy Week are as follows:

Palm Sunday – there will be in-person service with communion. There won't be a procession into church (palms will be available for distribution in church). For anyone who can't come to in-person service on Sunday, there will be a drive-by distribution of palms on the Saturday before. Decorative palms can be removed by Altar Guild after Palm Sunday service. And the large wooden cross can be removed as well, so there is less to be removed on Maundy Thursday.

Maundy Thursday – there will be in-person service with communion; no foot washing; Fr. Kirk will strip the altar himself.

Good Friday – we will not have service, but we are encouraged to watch the live stream service by the diocese.

Easter Sunday – there will be in-person service with communion.

We will need ushers at the in-person services. Molly will help coordinate the schedule of who is available to be an usher on the applicable days each month. There should be no overhead fans, but the windows will need be opened before service and closed after everyone leaves. The collection plate can be placed on the back table (where bulletins used to go, as those will be placed in pews). The tray with communion wafers will be placed on the separate octagonal table near the back of the church.

Sr. Warden's report – some outside groups (AA and aerobics) have started meeting back in-person in the Parish Hall, following the re-opening protocols. The ECW would like to begin meeting in April in the Parish Hall with windows open and appropriate spacing between seats. They'd like to create raffle baskets to sell in the Spring - Molly will confirm this with Canon Scott Slater to find out if any special protocols need to be followed.

The next meeting will be on 4/21 at 7:00pm.

At 8:52pm, the meeting ended with a closing prayer.

Elizabeth (Libby) Bradfield Ohl

Libby grew up in Rosedale, near Overly with her two sisters, Jeane (95) and Ester who had Downs Syndrome. She attended Gardenville Elementary, Hamilton Jr. High and Eastern High School. She loved Home Economics, especially sewing. She was very tall (5'10") so if she wanted certain clothes she made them. Her family attended St. Mathias Church in Overlea and Gardenville. (another small world, our Leslie Amtmann attended there also when young). Libby liked this church because it was small and family oriented. But St. Mathias Church was too small for her wedding, so she got married at St. Thomas Episcopal Church (she didn't know then that this was the church that Pat Rohrman attended growing up – small world!).

Libby met her husband at a national organization called "The Tower Club". It was named after the Baltimore Shot Tower and was for tall people. Her husband passed away at age 31 and Libby was left raising 3 children. Albert who lives in PA and loves horses, Kathleen Elizabeth who loves boating in Florida and Andrew who loves hunting and the outdoors in Idaho. Kathleen was named after a song "Take Me Home Again Kathleen" that played on the radio (any one ever hear this song?!). TV was not around early on.

Due to her height she was able to do modeling for Lane Bryant. She did this as a volunteer for the Tower Club. Financially she was ok but with three children she did odds and ends jobs over the years. She has driven a truck 3 days a week and delivered eggs. She sold vegetables (arrabing in her station wagon in the summer with her kids) to a lot of her father's friends and business clients who were in the automobile business (they lived next door to Kelly Pontiac).

Libby loved family parties. Her family had a large dining room with 6 windows. She is a very good cook and has donated some of her great cakes to Christ Church events and has kept active with the ECW projects.

Patricia Ann Hornig Rohrman

Pat is the youngest of three girls and was born at St. Joseph's Hospital in Baltimore (see both women had two sisters). She attended Montebello Elementary, Clifton Park Junior High and Eastern High School. Her church family at that time was at St. Thomas' Episcopal Church – The Alamedo in Baltimore. Pat met her future husband, Charlie, at the Youth Fellowship there when she was sixteen years old. Eight years later they were married and enjoyed 58 years together until his passing in 2014.

In 1963 the Rohrmans migrated to Harford County and built their home on Boggs Road in Forest Hill. Pat still resides there. They joined Christ Church and enjoyed many years here. She has seen many, many changes. They have participated in almost every activity at Christ Church over the years – Vestry, Altar Guild, ECW, the Spring chicken dinners and the Fall turkey dinners. They were very instrumental in putting on the highly successful Apple Festivals a few years ago.

After their retirement from their full time jobs, they enjoyed volunteering in the County. And what a help they were! They mailed out the newsletter for the Office of Aging. They worked at the Community Action Agency with their food pantry and spice programs. Pat also volunteered at the Sheriff's Control Records Department, when they upgraded their computer. She put in over 12,000 arrest reports and volunteered over 1,000 hours.

Finally after her retirement from the County, she says she has had the privilege of becoming a member of the Piecemakers Quilting Group. She says that this is truly a great, talented group of ladies who try to bring some joy to this troubled world. They have giver many quilts to hospitals, the ill and just this last Christmas they donated quilts to the teenagers in foster care to name just a few of the places where they donate. The Church and ECW have also been thankful to them for their donation of many quilts for fundraising raffles.

Financial Update

Right to the point, money is a little tight right now. We are receiving on average, about nine hundred dollars less each month than we did this time last year. Although utility expenses are a little less since we are not using the Church and Parish Hall as much, the income is not keeping pace with overall expense.

On a positive note, your generous contributions to the Warm Hearts Cool Worship campaign for the major air conditioning expense we incurred in 2019, have allowed us to repay \$20,699 (73%) of the \$28,275 loan. We have only \$7,576 yet to pay. Last year, contributions totaled \$6,635. With a little extra effort, we may be able to pay off the loan by the end of the year!
