FROM THE DEACON'S BENCH

Dear Friends in Christ,

As Holy Week and Easter fast approach, I find this Lenten Season has been one of unprecedented times. I personally, don't ever remember church services being cancelled, and yet here we are. In times of uncertainty, we have always been able to turn to our houses of faith for strength and comfort. This Corona virus is not to be taken lightly. I imagine there will not be one of us who at the end of it all has not been affected or know someone who has. As the news has told us, the majority of cases will be mild, but those with pre-existing illnesses, the elderly and the immune compromised are at a higher risk for complications related to this virus. And we can see from the grocery stores, that fear has already become our emotional pandemic.

And I think about 2000 years ago, when Jesus and His disciples were on their way to Jerusalem, they too were unsure, they too were filled with fear, Jesus knew his fate, yet, he too, felt some trepidation, as He went into the Garden of Gethsemane to pray; asking God to take this cup from Him, but only if it is God's will. And of course, we know that Jesus fulfilled God's will saving all of us and promising us life eternal with Him.

Fear can be paralyzing. Remember that it is said some 50 or 60 times in the Bible- Do Not Be Afraid, Fear Not and yet there are still times that bring us fear. We will come to the other side of this viral pandemic; we will see Easter. Until then, in times of anxiousness search out the words Fear Not or Do Not Be Afraid in the Bible, or on your phone- and spend time in contemplative prayer with God.

Fear not, for I am with you, be not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you, I will help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand. Isaiah 41: I am praying for all of you; your families, our community and our World,

HISTORY OF FUNDRAISERS AT HOLY TRINITY

From the beginning of Holy Trinity Church in Essex in 1948, fundraisers were a very important part of a growing church.

One of the early fundraisers that I remember was the Sour Beef and Dumpling Dinner. If you have ever made dumplings for your own family, you know how long it takes for those dumplings to boil! The hungry parishioners who came to eat at Holy Trinity were grumbling about getting their dumplings in a timely manner, and the women in the kitchen were frantic because they just couldn't keep up with the demand.

The other fundraiser was an Oyster and Ham Supper. Like the dumplings, they couldn't get the oysters fried fast enough!

The Fall Festival was a very special occasion! The Sunday School area became a Japanese Tea Room with our young girls dressed in kimonos to serve the tea that was in authentic Japanese tea cups. There was a country store, bake table, luncheon, games and babysitting service.

Holy Trinity also participated in the Carnival at Middlesex. It ran for several days. Our church people worked the stand and received part of the receipts. It was a lot of work. All of these fundraisers took place at the old church on Eastern Avenue.

After we moved to Mace Avenue, we continued to have fundraisers. They were a part of our church life as we were always short of income.

We had Strawberry and Peach Festivals with a pit beef stand out on our parking lot. For several summers, we had a snowball stand that was very successful. The youth of the church took responsibility for running the stand. They learned how to handle money, mix flavors, clean up and show up on time for their shift. The stand was at the front of the driveway where the flower garden is now located.

The church women, under the guidance of Mary Webb, made cookies every fall along with hard candy. In 1992, the profit from the cookies and candy was \$3,000. It took 933 hours to make 900 pounds of cookies and 250 pounds of hard candy! Of course, I have written about the Dinner Theater fundraisers previously.

Today, the men and women at Holy Trinity make Easter eggs that bring in substantial funds.

In the past, we have always depended on fundraisers. They can be fun and build fellowship. However, they are labor intensive and time consuming. However, the end results are rewarding!

Do we still need fundraisers?
