THE MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Along with all of you, I am filled with joy at our regathering. Beginning on June 7th, we have been able to worship in our beautiful church, although the "new normal" still takes getting used to. Wearing masks, keeping prayer books in plastic bags, not singing, and not receiving Holy Communion are all difficult changes to accept. I do hope that everyone understands the necessity of these measures. Let us give thanks to God that we are able to worship together again.

I am happy to announce that we will begin receiving the Body of Christ in Holy Communion on July 5th. I have worked out the details with the diocese, and I will explain how it works that morning (and as often as new people are present). The goal, of course, is to protect everyone from transmission of the virus as much as possible.

Like many of you, I watch the daily news and see things on the Internet that are disturbing and concerning. I'm sure there are as many feelings and opinions about the events and news as there are people in our parish, but we all share a common faith.

We all make the same baptismal promises (*Book of Common Prayer, pages 304-305*). I believe that we all sincerely mean it when we make those commitments. And I also know it is possible for each of us to interpret them differently. But I hope that no one dismisses them or refuses to keep them. I re-read them several times a week, and I hope that you will go back from time to time and prayerfully, thoughtfully consider what they mean in your life.

The leaders of our diocese, and of The Episcopal Church itself, are speaking out and taking loving actions for the good of the people who are suffering most in the multiple crises that surround us. They are joining their voices with those of religious leaders from many faiths. They are communicating with the public in all forms of media, using whatever influence they have in today's secular world, trying to remind our leaders and everyone of the principles of faith that we share.

A parent with a child who is very ill will naturally spend more time and attention on the suffering of that one child. It doesn't mean they love their other children any less, nor does it mean they do not love all their children equally. All of that parent's children matter, but the one in crisis, the one who is suffering the most, rightly needs and deserves more care and love. Jesus told us that a good shepherd will leave the 99 and go search for the one that is lost. [Luke 15:4]

Many ministers, including Episcopal pastors and other clergy in our diocese, are preaching about these matters. I don't know if you would prefer that I do that, or are glad that I refrain from doing so. My position, for as long as I have been a priest, is that I will never "preach politics" from the pulpit, but people have different ideas about what the word *politics* means.

What I will do is (a) answer your questions about what I think, but only if you ask; (b) follow my principles of faith in my own life of prayer and service; (c) take an active part as a citizen in current events, and support whatever causes seem to me to be appropriate; and (d) preach about morality, ethics, justice, and Christian theology.

I try to follow St Paul's model:

"When I came to you, brothers and sisters... I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified." [*First Corinthians 2:1-2*]

I promise you this: I will always speak from my heart, my faith in God, and my love for all God's people. My goal is always to proclaim Christ crucified in a way that speaks in your hearts and minds.

Please pray for me as your pastor, your preacher, and your friend. Please encourage me, correct me, teach me, and love me as your brother in Christ.

Covenant for Regathering — May, 2020

In response to the current COVID-19 pandemic, I promise, with God's help and to the best of my ability, to abide by the guidelines of the Diocese of Maryland for participation in the life of my congregation according to the regathering phase in which my congregation is authorized to carry out its mission and ministry.

In fulfillment of the Baptismal Covenant (*BCP* p. 304-305), I will strive to: Love my neighbor as myself, I will...

- Wear a mask or scarf over my nose and mouth at all times in church buildings, except momentarily to receive the sacrament or lead worship through an assigned speaking part, and follow public health guidelines for hand sanitizing and disinfecting
- Only attend worship and receive communion if I am non-symptomatic for the COVID-19 virus or any other transmittable disease that could compromise the health of another congregant
- Will abstain from attending if doing so would put me at greater risk due to my own health status

Respect the dignity of every human being, I will...

- Make no physical contact with people beyond the members of my own household
- Maintain a six foot or more distance from other members of the congregation
- Respect any requests for distance, masking, cleaning, to ensure the safety and comfort level of others

Seek and serve Christ in all people...

- Trust and support the decisions of both my diocesan and congregational leaders
- Stay connected with others in my community by telephone, video chat, or mail

Information from Our Parish Nurse

Handwashing and Masks are the best way to stop the spread of any disease either viral or bacterial. We as a people are in charge of our own health. We must protect ourselves and each other as we go out in public. I will admit masks can be uncomfortable but are only needed when you are in a public area with people other than your immediate family.
