From the Rector

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. (Acts 2:1-4 NRSV)

We celebrate the Day of Pentecost this month on May 23rd. On this day, the church will be bathed in the color red, symbolizing the coming of the Holy Spirit. The liturgical color red has dual meanings. We use it during Holy Week to represent Christ's sacrifice – his blood that was poured out for his Church. This is why it is also used as the liturgical color of Christian martyrs on their feast days. On the Day of Pentecost, however, red represents fire. The fire of the Holy Spirit as described in Acts 2:3 above.

A Message from the Claggett Center Summer Youth Camp



Summer camp is back in 2021! With enhanced safety measures in place, we are looking forward to a summer full of new adventures. Summer camp will look different this year than it ever has before. We expect that Covid-19 will still be a factor in our area, and all campers and staff will work together to create a safe and holy environment. We can't wait to welcome back summer campers for all the fun, friendship, and wonder that we experience at camp, even as we learn new ways to be together in community.

This summer, you can expect:

- **Reduced session capacity.** Each camp session will be limited to 42 campers to allow for social distance in all program areas. We have added a second Middle School session to accommodate more campers.
- **Flexible refund policy.** All deposits will be fully refundable up to one month from the start of your session. Within one month of a session, \$100 deposits will be held with exceptions made for COVID symptoms or exposure. If your camper exhibits symptoms of illness, or is exposed to someone with COVID-19 within two weeks of their session start, your deposit will be refunded.
- **Getting to know your neighbors.** For this year, we will trade out our traditions of large-group gatherings for a model based around "family groups:" 6-10 people who share living quarters and dining tables, and cohorts that combine two family groups for daytime activities. We'll find creative ways to use our outside space in order to see other friends from a greater distance.
- **Additional safety measures and communication.** The Claggett team is continuing to develop our health and safety plans for this summer, as we stay in conversation with our local health department, colleagues in Episcopal Camps and Conference Centers nationwide and the American Camp Association. We will update our general information, and registered families, regularly with more details about what to expect at camp this summer.

National Nurse's Week

National Nurses Week is celebrated this year on May 6th-May 12th by nurses, employers, and staff by acknowledging the importance of our nurses, as well as promoting the nursing profession and the significant role it plays in the world of healthcare.



During this past year in the Covid-19 Pandemic nurses played a vital role in health care in caring for patients with Covid-19 and still are caring for Covid patients today. Nurses are now playing an important role in administering the Covid-19 vaccines in our country. Covid-19 has brought attention to nursing more than ever before, however nursing has been the most valued profession for many years. Nursing is said to be the most trustworthy of professions. Almost everyone knows a nurse!

The word nurse means “to nourish” from the Latin word nutrix. Nursing describes the nurse as a person who nourishes, fosters, and protects the sick, injured, aged, and dying. Expanded roles in nursing are now focused on health promotion and preventative care and care of people throughout the lifespan. Nurses work in a variety of settings such as; hospitals, doctor’s offices, free-standing medical facilities such as Patient First, in schools, colleges, home health, nursing homes, rehab, employment agencies, surgical centers, major corporations, and for insurance companies.

This month I wanted to highlight some of the various degrees of nursing and their roles.

Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN): Also called the vocational nurse. These nurses provide bedside nursing to patients. LPN programs are typically 1-year in length and licensure is through the national board exam. Nurses in this role work in hospitals, long term care facilities and in home health settings.

Registered Nurse (RN): There are 3 types of registered nurse programs; diploma, associate, and baccalaureate degree programs. Graduates from these programs take the national examination. Once passed they practice in the state in which they took and passed their examination. Nurse’s can apply to other states for a nursing license in that state and may carry licenses in multiple or compact states. Registered nurses work in a variety of health care settings. The preferred registered nurse today is the Baccalaureate Nurse. The master’s degree (MSN) nurse functions in educational settings, manager roles, and advanced practice specialties. Nurses with doctoral degrees carry out research. The Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) was formulated in 2004 and is an upcoming role in which nurses can work in education or research settings.

Certified Registered Nurse Practitioner (CRNP): A nurse with an advanced degree in specific specialty such as; family, women’s health, dermatology, neonatology, etc. The NP works in a variety of health settings to deliver health assessments, diagnoses, and can write prescriptions.

National Nurse's Week Continued

Certified Nurse Midwife (CRNM): A nurse who completes a program in midwifery to provide prenatal and postnatal care and deliver's babies in low-risk women. They also provide women's health through the lifespan.

Certified Registered Nurse Anesthesiologist (CRNA): A nurse who completes study in an anesthesiology school. This nurse can administer and monitor anesthesia in surgical patients and during pre and post-surgical care.

Registered Nurse First Assistants (RNFA): This nurse receives additional education in surgery and can assist a surgeon in the operating room.

Nurse Educator: A nurse with an advanced degree who teaches in educational and clinical settings. This nurse teaches theoretical knowledge and clinical skills and can conduct research.

Clinical Nurse Specialist: This nurse has an advanced degree, advanced education, and experience in a specialized area of nursing. This nurse carries out care, teaching, consultation and may also provide education and research to staff. An example would be a wound care nurse or an infection control nurse.

Nurse Administrator: This nurse functions in a variety of roles in management in health care settings. They are responsible for the management and administering of resources and personnel involved in providing patient care.

Clinical Nurse Leader (CNL): The CNL is an emerging nursing role and is an advanced clinician with a master's degree. This nurse uses evidence-based practice (EBP) to ensure that patients benefit from the latest innovations in care. They may also care for patients with complex situations.
