
Outreach



We are still trying to figure out how we can best continue to provide groceries to persons in need since the FISH program has been discontinued. The unique aspect of the FISH program was that we delivered food to people in their homes. FISH had a dedicated answering service where people would call, describe their need, and leave their contact information. Then a volunteer on duty for that day of the month would retrieve the calls on the answering machine, contact the person who called and arrange to deliver food to them. I have

spoken with several local food pantries in our area including St. Matthews, Oak Grove, Thy Kingdom Come, Smith's Chapel, St. Joan of Arc, and Grace Church in Darlington. All of these

provide groceries to people who drive to the pantry to pick up pre-loaded bags of groceries on the designated day. Some pantries offer groceries twice a week, once a week, once a month and once every other month. All of these operations are on a much larger scale than ours and use food distributed by the Maryland Food Bank which requires significant paper work and record keeping not to mention much expanded food storage space and pick-up trucks to accept the monthly Food Bank donations. I am currently contacting other agencies that may have clients who occasionally appeal to them for food assistance and am offering our church



office number as a point of contact. Also, we are temporarily posting a line on our church sign that reads "Emergency Food" and gives the church office number. We don't know what will work best for us yet, but will continue to explore alternatives. We welcome your suggestions.

Stay Out of the Sun

This year, July 3, 2021, has been designated National Stay Out of The Sun Day. Why, you ask, well this is a day that encourages everyone to give their skin a break from the sun and heat. It is hard to imagine that there would be a day devoted to just staying indoors. However, you do not need to stay indoors to avoid the sun as you can incorporate activities

outside that are out of the sun's dangerous rays. Set up a chair under a canopy, perch yourself under an umbrella, set up a hammock in the shade, or wait till the sun goes down and take in an evening stroll watching the sunset. Indoor activities could include visiting a friend, going to the movies, volunteering at your local shelter, or going on a shopping spree.

Moderate sun exposure provides our bodies with a healthy dose of natural Vitamin D but spending too much time basking in the sun without proper attire and/or proper sunscreen can speed up the aging process and can cause skin cancer. When in the sun use an umbrella, wear a hat that covers your ears, wear sunglasses to protect your eyes, and lather yourself in sunscreen with at least 45 SPF. Sunscreen should be worn even on cloudy days and reapplied often.

The history of sunscreen began in the 1940's when an American airman created a formula that would later become "Coppertone". In the 1950's the Coppertone baby became a billboard phenomenon. In the early 1970's ultraviolet filters were introduced into sunscreens. It was not until 1978 that the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulated sunscreen and set standards for its safety and efficacy. Today sunscreen is readily available in any store and is available in creams, lotions, sprays, gels, pastes, sticks, butters, and towelette wipes.

National Stay Out of The Sun Day entices people to take care of their skin. Staying out of the sun or wearing sunscreen keeps our skin youthful and prevents wrinkles and premature aging.

So, on July 3rd, hang up those beach towels, put on your pajamas, watch some Netflix, read a good book, play a game, bake a cake, and give yourself a break from the sun!


