And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight to help you to determine what is best, so that in the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God. (Philippians 1:9-11, NRSV)

The early Christian community in Philippi, Greece was one of Apostle Paul's greatest successes. When you read Paul's epistle to this church, you'll notice that it's largely absent of the typical admonishments or words of correction that are found in his other epistles. Paul is rather fond of the Philippians for their good works, faith in his teachings, and their sense of responsibility for the community. I like to think of Holy Trinity as a community that follows in the example of the Philippians. We're unlike the church in Corinth, and if you're not sure what I mean by that, I invite you to read Paul's first epistle to the Corinthians. We are a community that pulls together, takes care of one another and works to bring about God's Kingdom in our community. We take our Christian call and our sense of responsibility for one another seriously.

- October 24th: Holy Eucharist Rite II led by The Rev. Mary Davisson+



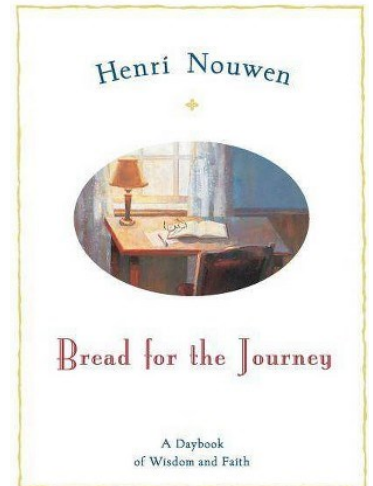

Breast Cancer Awareness



Most of us know or have known of someone who has been affected by breast cancer. October is breast cancer awareness month. During October the American Cancer Society brings education and awareness to this very important killer of both men and women. We hear so much about breast cancer today, however we may not understand the risks for developing this disease, how we can prevent it, and what to do if a person feels that they may have breast cancer.

Although men can also be affected by breast cancer, discussion here will concentrate on how breast cancer affects women.

Age and family history are two important risk factors for breast cancer. The risk of breast cancer increases after the age of 40 and increases with age. Having a first-degree relative (mother, sister, daughter) or two or more first or second-degree relatives (aunt, grandmother) that has been diagnosed with breast cancer increases a woman's risk. If a relative was diagnosed with breast cancer at the age of 45 or younger a woman's risk increases. A family history of ovarian cancer increases the chances of a woman carrying the BRCA gene which increases breast cancer risk.

Lifestyle can be a major influencer for breast cancer however lifestyle changes can decrease your risk. Obesity is becoming more of a risk, however with diet and exercise the risk decreases. Eating a diet that includes fresh fruits and vegetables, whole grains, fiber, and foods with healthy fats such as avocados and nuts can decrease breast cancer risk. Limiting alcohol can help because alcohol impacts how you metabolize estrogen. High concentrations of estrogen in the body can increase your risk. Researchers say that women should not have more than one drink per day.

The hormone estrogen does play a role in breast cancer, therefore hormone replacement therapy (HRT) after menopause should be discussed with your doctor and only used for short period of time.

Exercising for 30 minutes a day at least 5 days a week leads to a healthier lifestyle and decreases the risk of breast cancer. Exercises that can be helpful include, brisk walking, jogging, biking, and swimming.

Breast Cancer Awareness Continued

Preventative measures include seeing your doctor for breast exams yearly and doing self-breast exams every month. Women without risk should begin mammograms at the age of 40. A woman with risk factors may begin mammograms at an earlier age based on their doctor's recommendations. Other screenings such as ultrasound or breast MRI can also be done depending on mammogram results or the recommendation of your doctor.

Replacement COVID Vaccination Card Process



If you need a replacement copy of your COVID-19 vaccination card, Maryland MyIR is a free online service where consumers can view and print copies of their official vaccination records directly from ImmuNet, Maryland's secure immunization information system.

Maryland MyIR was developed through a partnership between Maryland Department of Health and Scientific Technologies Corporation, with support from the Department of Health and Human Services and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Please note that you will need to type in your name exactly as you did when you received your COVID-19 vaccine(s). Any inconsistency may result in the system being unable to retrieve your vaccination record.

About Your Vaccine Card

- It is not recommended to laminate your vaccination card. If your vaccine information is recorded on the card using a printed label, laminating the card could burn the label, making it impossible to read. Also, as the research on COVID immunity becomes clearer, you may require a booster shot in the future, which will need to be recorded on the card. The best way to protect your vaccine card is by keeping it in a secure location. The CDC also recommends that you make a backup copy by taking a photo of the card.
- Do not carry your vaccine card with you. Instead, keep your vaccine card in a secure location. Use your smartphone to take a picture of your card so that you always have a record of it with you.
- Protect yourself from scammers. There has been a lot of misinformation spread about COVID-19 and the vaccines, leaving the door open for scammers to take advantage of vulnerable people. Be aware when receiving any unexpected phone calls, e-mails or text messages. Do not click on links from unknown senders, answer questions about your personal medical history or provide financial information.

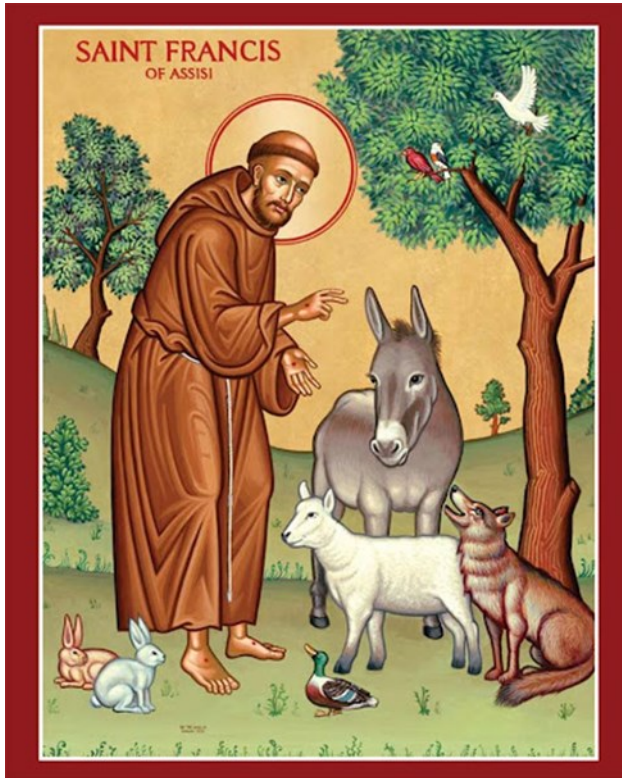


Bassoon Recital
